Reports of the last two Section Summer 2016 Outings

Whitefriars excavations

On a rainy Wednesday evening on 3rd August Derek Hall gave 25 PSNS members and friends a tour of his excavations at Whitefriars in Perth. He told us of his previous excavations here in 1982 and 2008 and of the present excavation that he has been working on mostly single-handedly since 2014. He showed us the foundations of the earlier Carmelite church and the evidence of the

later extension by the Bishop of Dunkeld. He also pointed out two mason's marks on the corner of the original church, built 1262, one of which matches a mason's mark found by SUAT in 2004 at the Horsecross excavations in the area of the Blackfriars grounds.

He has also uncovered the West range and pointed out what he believes is a drain and an anvil site.

Moredun Top Hillfort Excavations

On Thursday 22 September five members of the Section and three guests attended the excavations at Moredun hillfort on Moncreiffe Hill being conducted under the auspices of the Tay Landscape Partnership. We were shown round by Sophie Nicoll of TLP on a dry, sunny but blustery day.

Following on from last year's excavations on Moredun, four trenches were being excavated by volunteers and members of AOC Archaeology. Trench A on the summit was across two, possibly three hut circles; a wall-face of one was being uncovered. Some squared blocks were among the stone tumble, along with a cup-marked stone. Trench B was across another possible hut circle a short distance away.

Trench C revealed the most spectacular discovery of the excavations: a broch or dun first found last year. The wall followed the contours of the natural bedrock and contained a reused cup-marked



stone. The entrance into the structure had been found and the bedrock in front of the wall had been stepped.

Trench D was located over the presumed 'well' to investigate whether it was a cut feature. Two concentric alignments of stones, possibly for enclosures around the 'well' were uncovered.

Finds include shale offcuts suggesting shale working in the fort as well as jet bracelet fragments, animal bone and teeth, including burnt bones, and Iron Age pottery.
